Waynesboro Family Loses **Everything In Residential** Fire Friday Night



A Waynesboro family sadly lost their home and all its contents after a fire broke out just before 8:00 p.m. on Friday night, June 24.

Family members stated that a minor child living at the residence belonging to David "Shorty" Horner and Shonda Blalock on Mumaw Road in the Beech Creek community first smelled smoke and then observed flames in the rear of the home at approximately 8:00 p.m. on Friday. The whole family was at home when the fire broke out, but everyone was able to escape without injury. Unfortunately, the home and all the family's belongings were a total loss with the exception of the clothes they were wearing.

The cause and origin of the fire are still under investigation. A GoFundMe page has been set up for donations for the family, or those wishing to help may call Kara Turnbow at 731-267-7067 for more information.

Hollis Academy: Continuing Thirty Years Of Excellence

Hollis Academy, first known as Wayne Halfway House, began as Lige Hollis' vision in 1992. Lige had a vision of a place that would help change the lives of young men that had come from difficult circumstances - a place that would help these young men grow past their difficulties and become productive members of society. Originally just a 16-bed facility, Wayne Halfway House built on its original principles, adding staff and the capability to help even more youth until it became a 52bed facility in 2002.

Jason Crews began a career in youth services much the same as



Jason with wife Bridget and daughters Raegan and Karson.

Lige had – with a vision of helping young people overcome difficult circumstances. He envisioned helping young people turn into adults they and their loved ones could be proud of. Jason began his career as a residential case manager for the Department of Children's Services in 2000. His work with DCS led to his working closely with Lige at Wayne Halfway House, and that working relationship turned into

a deep and lasting friendship between two men who not only had many common interests, but had a common goal - helping troubled youth. Lige eventually asked Jason to help him establish a program that would not only help young men resolve behavioral, social, and mental health issues, but more importantly, help them permanently exit dependence on "The System."

Early Voting To Begin Friday, July 15

Early voting begins on Friday, July 15 for the upcoming County General, State Primary, and Waynesboro Municipal Election. The last day for early voting will be Saturday, July 30, and the election will take place on Thursday, August 4. Those who choose not to participate in early or absentee voting will vote on Election Day at their assigned polling place.

The hours for early voting are Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m., and on Saturdays from 8:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon. Early voting will take place in the Election Commission Office in the basement level of the Wayne County Administrative Building (formerly the Wayne County Courthouse) on the square in Waynesboro.

Anyone voting in person during early voting or on Election Day must present a photo ID issued by the federal or Tennessee state government. To learn more about the photo ID requirements, visit the website http://sos.tn.gov/products/ elections/what-id-required-when-

If you wish to vote absentee by mail, you must meet certain legal requirements. A voter who wishes to vote absentee by mail must request an application for an absentee ballot. Requests for absentee ballots may be made in person at the Wayne County Election Commission office or by mail. Requests for absentee applications must be received no later than July 28, 2022. The request must include ALL of the following information:

- Name of the registered voter
- Voter's legal residence (911 address) in Wayne County
- Voter's date of birth
- Voter's social security number
- Address to mail the ballot to (if different from residence address)
- Election(s) the voter wishes to

Meet The Candidates For Wayne Co. Executive, Sheriff

The office of Wayne County Executive will be filled after the election by one of two candidates: current Wayne County Executive Jim Mangubat, or Wayne County Commissioner Phillip Casteel.

This week in our "Meet the Candidates" series, we presented each candidate with three questions regarding their experience and their vision for the future of Wayne County. Below are our questions and the candidates' responses.

JIM MANGUBAT

WCN: Mr. Mangubat, you have made the decision to run for reelection to the position of Wayne County Executive. What prompted you to run for re-election to this

Mangubat: We have so many projects on the table that I'd like to continue, with our local, state, and regional partners, to help bring to fruition including the Ag Center (major impact for Collinwood area), the Recreational facility and greenway plan (Waynesborofunded by TN Dept of Health)- to help plan a youth rec facility I've wanted and pushed for since I've been in office, and support Clifton's efforts in building a state of the art water treatment facility to serve more residents in the coming years. Also, a new Head-Start Building which is in process. It is a \$1.4 million dollar project using Federal, not County Funds. I want to continue the work on the Musician's Walk of Fame to increase Tourism. I want to continue bringing new educational programming to support our existing industries while giving our youth more opportunities, and support efforts underway to further develop our industrial parks in order to bring more high-quality jobs to Wayne County. So many, including myself, do not realize the years of planning that go into a project before a community begins to see progress. I believe we are at a tipping point and as long as we all continue to work together, despite our indifferences, we have many good days on the horizon.

Having lost his own father at the age of 15, Jason is quick to acknowledge Lige's influence in his life, which in turn has helped him to be a positive influence on the young men he works with on a daily basis. He says that Lige taught him a lot about being humble, and helped him to see that everything is not just black and white - there are many shades of grey in between.

After Lige's retirement in 2005 due to a prolonged illness, Jason Crews became President and CEO of Wayne Halfway House. The facility was renamed Hollis Academy in 2015 in Lige's honor. Lige passed away at the age of 69 on December 5, 2017.

In 2019, Hollis Academy expanded to include a facility in Nashville called Standing Tall Music City. The largest facility in the Academy family to date, Mountain View Youth Academy, opened in Dandridge, TN (near Knoxville) in 2020. Also opening in 2020 was Hollis Residential Treatment Center in Columbia, TN. Jackson Academy in Jackson, TN joined the family of facilities in October 2021.

Wayne Provision is one of the newest businesses in the Hollis Academy family, and facilitates foster care programs for the previously detained/incarcerated young men once they are released. "A lot of the progress made by these young men in our detention facilities can be completely lost when they are released," said Crews. "By providing foster homes for them to enter when they are released, we are at least

offering them more help with introducing them back into society."

Crews said that his employ companies approximately 500 people at all the facilities combined. "A lot of these people have been with me for 15 or 20 years," he said. "And I am only as good as the people around me."

Crews explained how these young men arrive at the facilities, and what they do once they get there. He said that when they are arrested, they first go to a juvenile detention facility for up to 20 days. After the initial detention period, they are transferred to a facility such as Hollis Academy. The charges against the youth usually determine their facility placement, with less violent offenders usually being placed in Hollis Academy or a similar facility. Crews said that the Mountain View facility near Knoxville is where a lot of the youth end up who have more violent or higher level charges.

A day at Hollis Academy consists mostly of education. Hollis Academy has eight or nine teachers on staff at any given time, and the detainees are taught based on their assessed level upon arrival. Along with their daily schooling, the young men also have three meals, snacks, rest/quiet time, and different activities, such as swimming on Wednesday evenings. The schedule they are on is necessary for things to run smoothly, and to instill discipline in the young men

As Jason Crews readily admits, things don't always run smoothly at the facilities.





in Iron City, TN. He loved his church and spent much time helping others, spent many happy hours in his woodworking shop, and was also an avid gardener.



New Laws To Take Effect On July 1, 2022

the beginning of a new fiscal year, but it is also the date that many new laws will go into effect in Tennessee. From the state budget to public safety measures, the following is a list of some of the key legislation passed by the General Assembly in 2022 that will become law July 1.

Budget and Tax Relief

Budget — This year's nodebt budget highlights lawmakers' continuous efforts to cut taxes for Tennesseans, maintain fiscal responsibility, ensure public safety and prioritize education. Going into effect on July 1, 2022, it invests \$52.8 billion in the state of Tennessee for the 2022/2023 fiscal year, with total legislative initiatives making up \$84.1 million recurring and \$570.8 million in non-recurring expenditures.

Removing license plate registration fee - From July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023 Tennesseans will not have to pay the state's annual license plate registration fee of \$23.75. This is a financial relief measure that will

K-12 Education

Blocking obscene materials on school computers - A new law was passed to ensure vendors that contract with schools comply with state law to prohibit pornography and obscene materials from school computers. It requires vendors to take steps to block any inappropriate content on school computers. If a provider fails to comply with the new law, then a LEA may withhold further payments to the provider and ultimately consider non-compliance a breach of contract. The law also requires each local board of education to establish a mechanism for parents to report a failure of the technology selected by the LEA to prevent access to harmful materials, and submit an annual report to the State Board of Education on the successes or failures of the technology.

Ensuring fairness in girls' sports / K-12 – The General Assembly approved a new law to enforce legislation passed last year that prohibits biological males from participating in girls' sports in public K-12 education institutions. The new law requires the Tennessee Department of Education to withhold a portion of state funds from public middle or high schools that fail or refuse to uphold state law and instead allow biological males to compete in girls' sports at public K-12 schools.

Taking action against abortion advocacy in public schools — A new law prohibits an LEA or public charter school seeking assistance in teaching family life from knowingly enter-

July 1, 2022 not only marks ing into an agreement with a person or entity that performs abortions, induces abortions, provides abortion referrals, or provides funding, advocacy or other support for abortions.

Criminal Sentencing / Public Safety

Truth in Sentencing – To protect victims of crime and provide true accountability for those who commit crimes, a new law requires a person convicted of certain offenses to serve 100% of the sentence imposed before becoming eligible for release. It ensures criminals convicted of eight different offenses would have to serve 100% of their sentence undiminished by any sentence reduction credits for which the person is eligible or earns. These eight offenses include: attempted first degree murder, second degree murder, vehicular homicide, especially aggravated kidnapping, especially aggravated robbery, carjacking, and especially aggravated burglary. A person convicted of one of these eight offenses could still earn credits that can be used for increased privileges, reduced security classification, or for any purpose other than the reduction of the sentence imposed by the court. Under the legislation, another 16 offenses require 100% of the sentence to be served unless the inmate earns a satisfactory program performance. In these cases, a person can receive credits for a GED or job training. These credits could be used for parole eligibility once a person has served a minimum of 85% of their sentence.

Cracking down on child abusers – A new law strengthens penalties for emotional and mental abuse or neglect of children at an unlicensed childcare facility. It addresses an incident in East Tennessee, when 23 children were found at an unlicensed childcare facility, in a garage and restrained in car seats and high chairs for most of the day. Because no physical abuse had occurred, the punishment for those operating this facility was not as severe as it should have been. The new law enhances the penalty to a Class E felony for any person operating an unlicensed childcare facility and found guilty of abuse, neglect or endangerment of a child.

Joe Clyde Daniels Act – Under a new law, convicted murderers will have a harder time being granted parole if they do not disclose the location of their victim's remains. The Joe Clyde Daniels Act requires the board of parole to consider the extent to which the offender obstructed or continues to obstruct the ability of law enforcement to recover the remains of the victim when de-

ciding cases involving an offender convicted of homicide. The bill was prompted by the disappearance of 5-year-old Joe Clyde Daniels from his home in Dickson on April 4, 2018. His father, Joseph Daniels, was convicted of murder in June. However, the child's remains have never been found. It helps ensure victims can receive a proper burial.

Human trafficking — To crack down on criminals who traffic children, a new law will expand the criteria for what qualifies as Class A felony offense of trafficking for a commercial sex act. Under the new law a trafficker will be charged with a Class A felony if the victim is under the age of 18. Under previous statute the victim had to be under 15 for the Class A felony charge to apply. It also creates a Class A felony offense of aggravated trafficking for a commercial sex act, and requires those convicted to serve 100% of any sentence imposed.

Protecting against sex offenders — A new law prohibits a sexual offender, violent sexual offender, or a violent juvenile sexual offender from renting or offering to rent a swimming pool, hot tub or other body of water used for swimming. Violating this law would be a Class A misdemeanor.

Health / Healthcare

COVID-19 visitation law – A new law ensures that those who live in nursing homes and assisted living facilities will be allowed to have visitors in end-of-life situations, even during a public health emergency for COVID-19. It stipulates that visitors must agree to follow safety protocols and cannot exhibit symptoms of COVID-19 or other communicable diseases, and cannot violate federal or state law regulating each facility. During the height of the COVID-19 pandemic too many Tennesseans were not able to be with their loved ones in their last days. This law ensures that won't happen again.

Transportation and Safety Traffic safety — A new law allows a person convicted of speeding to take a defensive driving course within 90 days of their conviction in order to have up to 5 points removed from their driving record. This may be applied to only one speeding offense for each driving course completed and only once in a four-year period.

Increasing penalties for boating under the influence — To help keep Tennessee waterways safe, a new law increases penalties for boating under the influence. Called "Nicholas's Law," it makes a boating under the influence conviction equal to that of driving under the influence for the purpose of determining whether the offender is a repeat offender. In other words, if someone is convicted of boating under the influence and is later convicted of driving under the influence, they could be punished the same as if they were guilty of two DUIs.

Emergency Personnel / Law Enforcement / Correctional

Expanding benefits for firefighters injured in the line of duty — Under previous law, the Barry Brady Act allowed firefighters to be eligible for workers compensation benefits for certain cancers. The act established a presumption that any conditions or impairments of full-time firefighters were caused by certain occupational cancers which occurred while on the job. Cancers covered are non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, colon cancer, skin cancer, and multiple myeloma. A new law passed by the General Assembly this year expands the list of cancers to which the presumption applies to include leukemia and testicular cancer.

Strengthening protections for police and service animals — Legislation known as Joker's Law passed this year to strengthen the penalty for anyone who harms a law enforcement or service animal in Tennessee. The new law increases the penalty for anyone who knowingly and unlawfully kills a police dog, fire dog, search and rescue dog, service animal or police horse. Offenders would now be charged with a Class B felony. Anyone between the ages of 14 and 17 who kills or causes serious injury to one of those animals could also be tried as an adult. Previously, killing a law enforcement service animal was a minimum Class E felony. The law is named in honor of Joker, a K-9 with the Bradley County Sheriff's Office who was seriously injured after being shot during a pursuit last

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

and the county governments. I have worked with the Wayne County Commission to evolve the Wayne County Jail into the Wayne County workhouse. This allows inmates to get a job and earn wages to pay their court costs, fines, and child support while serving time for their convictions. I was able to work to acquire a grant to purchase a \$100,000 x-ray body scanner for the Wayne County Workhouse to help prevent illegal contraband or weapons from entering the facility. Understanding the liability of the corrections environment and that a single wrong decision could devastate the County Government operations, potentially bankrupting our county, is part of the job that I do not take lightly. I have implemented much needed computer equipment into our patrol vehicles without using any county tax dollars. This equipment allows officers to stay in their patrol areas instead of having to return to the main office in Waynesboro to file reports. I have worked with the County Commission to add the Wayne County Sheriff's Office South Precinct to better serve our citizens in southern Wayne County, this improves response times for emergency calls and also allows deputies to stay in the patrol zones instead of having to travel to Waynesboro so often. I have implemented body worn cameras to increase transparency and professionalism by our patrol deputies. The body cameras were purchased without using county tax dollars. I have implemented two (2) narcotics detection canines to our force without using county tax dollars. I have upgraded our patrol fleet, which patrols about 400,00 miles each year, without using any county tax dollars. This focus on patrol and deputies staying in their patrol areas longer has resulted in lower property crime rates and better partnerships with the communities. During my term, I have routinely held community partner meetings in each area of the county to allow citizens to address their concerns and learn of the activities from the Wayne County Sheriff's Office. I feel as I do possess, the quali-

and be successful as Sheriff of Wayne County. Understanding the entirety of the Office as a whole and how each part is integral to the success of the other is paramount when making decisions. I have worked to better educate myself with other sheriffs who have been successful and worked to implement needed changes in our operations at the Wayne County Sheriff's Office. I do believe I am the most qualified candidate and the only candidate with the education and experience necessary to manage the Wayne County Sheriff's Office.

WCN: What goals do you have for the future of the Wayne County Sheriff's Office, and what changes do you intend to make if you are reelected?

Easy Ways to Encourage Your Kids to Get Active

Physical activity is good for children's bodies. It promotes growth development and should be encouraged throughout the day for younger children. At least 60 minutes of activity a day helps older children and adolescents grow strong bones and muscles, build and maintain endurance a healthy weight. There's mounting evidence that to moderate vigorous physical activity also helps boost children's critical thinking skills, grade point averages and standardized test scores.

Plan time in your schedule for your children to engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity each day, which can accumulate with shorter chunks throughout the day. Remember to praise, reward and encourage your kids' physical activity.

Physical Education: For healthy lifestyles, children need both free play and specific instruction physical skills. An easy way for kids to meet this goal is by participating in physical education as part of the school day, when kids are in school.

Organized Activities: Adults or kids can organize active play. There are active indoor games such as Simon Says, and dozens of games to play outside — hopscotch, jump rope, dodge ball, Frisbee golf, badminton and volleyball. Depending on the season, plan trips to a local bowling alley, swimming pool or skating rink when those options are available.

Make Screen Time an Active Time: When going to play outside isn't an option, your children can play interactive video games that require physical activity such as tennis, bowling or baseball. You also can use dance videos and active video games for some physicallyactive television time.

Look into adding temporary stock tanks if you strictly pond water right now, as cattle are going to congregate in the ponds more right now and in turn will add more animal waste to their water source, which increases your chances of pathogens and toxins in the water. Blue-green algae is one you will want to keep an eye out for. If adding stock tanks is not an option, fence the pond off so that they only have access to a small portion of the pond for water. This is a recommended practice for watering cattle with ponds already.

- Provide adequate shade. Can your whole herd get in the shade? If not, you need to make it a priority to add shade in your pastures. This helps them reduce their heat loads!
- Do not work cattle in the evening or during the day. Only work them early morning when their heat load
- Control flies! (hold your MULTIPLE year, use a different chemical
- Remove bulls from the herd. Fertility is poor in hot weather and this will prevent your bull from chasing open cows and causing more stress

Be sure to also make a note of this weather event for your records. If you notice many open cows during calving season, it could be linked to

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
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Dixie Youth, This Is Our History

Dixie Youth Baseball was organized in the State of South Carolina in 1955. The name of the program in those days was Little Boys Baseball. In 1958 the name was changed to Dixie Youth Baseball.

There were four men who met to form a new baseball program. They began with only a dream of something that would be different from other youth baseball organizations. They had no financial backing from any organizations, just their beliefs that their goals were attainable and would meet the recreational needs of the youngsters and families within their communities. Danny Jones and Matt Goyak were Recreation Directors in North Charleston and Georgetown . Bill Hearth, Recreation Director for the City of Columbia joined in this effort, and Tom Linton, an attorney and a coach in one of the Columbia Leagues became the fourth member of this organizational team for the new program. The recreation professionals began the process of developing a set of playing rules, policy & by-laws for the program, while the attorney devoted his attention preparing the necessary paperwork, completing all the forms to incorporate the program in the State of South Carolina . They were successful in this effort. Little Boys Baseball Inc. became an official baseball program with the four incorporators, Matt Goyak, President, Bill Hearth, Vice President, Danny Jones Commissioner-Treasurer, Tom Linton, Secretary. Bill Hearth served in this position for a short period of time and left the program in 1956 and J. Newton Jones was elected Vice President.

While the program was established in South Carolina the founders anticipated it would be a program that would serve the needs of that State, but interest from adjoining states in this new program grew quickly. The 1956 season began and leagues were franchised in the states of Alabama, Virginia , Mississippi, Louisiana, and Florida. The first Little Boys Baseball World Series was played in Alexandria, Louisiana . The Greenville South Carolina team won this first World Series.

The most fundamental intent of Little Boys Baseball. Inc. was to develop a program which would emphasize local autonomy. They believed that the workers and parents in the local programs and would know what was best for them and their children. Customs will vary from community to community and leagues may establish policies for the operation of their local program. There are basic fundamental rules each league must follow, but the local autonomy for each league is still very much a part of the program today.

The program began with the belief that the leagues who are affiliated should have a voice in the running of the program. There is an established procedure for the election of the national board members from the leagues within each state. Each State has an equal number of members on the national board, and each board member serves for a term of three years. All leagues within the program has one vote, and a league official may only vote for one league.

Any individual who serves in an official capacity with Dixie Youth Baseball may submit a suggested rule or policy change. This proposed change must be submitted by June 1st to the Office of the Deputy Commissioner. The National Board of Directors will consider the proposed rule or policy change at their annual meeting.

Tournament play is always considered to be an exciting part of any baseball season. Dixie Youth Baseball offers tournaments from Sub-District to World Series play. All tournaments are double elimination tournaments. Any league that joins Dixie Youth Baseball is immediately eligible for tournament participation. Dixie Youth Tournaments are awarded on an invitational basis. Any Dixie Youth league is eligible to host a tournament. For information concerning tournament requirements the league should contact their nearest Dixie Youth official. Dixie Youth Baseball has an excellent scholarship program. The program began in 1961 when two scholarships were awarded in the amount of \$750.00. One scholarship of \$500.00 and one of \$250.00.

To be eligible for a scholarship the applicant must be: a: A high school senior

b: Have played Dixie Youth Baseball while he or she was 12 years of age or younger

c: Get an official Dixie Youth Baseball scholarship application. The are available on line, or from a Dixie Youth official. They

are very simple to complete & fill out

d: Mail the completed application to the correct address by. March 1st.

Little Boys Baseball began with a very different and unique plan when compared with other youth athletic program. While the name was changed, this has not changed with Dixie Youth Baseball, everyone in the program is a volunteer. From the National President, National Board Members, National Commissioner, coaches, workers in the leagues, they all are volunteers. There are a couple of ladies in the National office who are paid secretaries, but everyone else gives of their time to make this program serve the families in eleven states. Because of what they do, it continues to be a success.

Dixie Youth Baseball now has three World Series. There is the AAA World Series. This Series is for players. 10 years of age and under. There is also the Majors Division Series. This Series is for the 11 & 12 year old players. It has been in past years that the AAA Series and the Majors Series have been played together, same date & location. In 2006 the Board of Directors approved the addition of the O Zone World Series. This is for the 11 & 12 year old players. The difference is the base distance is 70 feet, and the pitching distance is 50 feet. The game is "open bases" with the runner leading off the base, balks called on the pitcher and regular baseball rules.

The year was 1955. Four men sat & discussed and planned for a youth, baseball program. Today you and I live in a new century and we enjoy the efforts of their planning. The name of the program has changed, thankfully the purpose & goals have remained the same..


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






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


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The History Of Dixie Softball




